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MAKING NOISE: MIKA TAJIMA ON YOUTUBE

New York artist Mika Tajima creates sculptures, installations, prints, and performances based on digital data that she collects. Her work often reflects the relationship between changing economic conditions and collective human emotions. *Meridian (Gold)*, a public sculpture commissioned by SculptureCenter and currently on view in Long Island City, Queens, uses illuminated fog to create a sense of flux, the intensity and gradations of color connected to fluctuations in the futures market.

William S. Smith, who wrote about Tajima in our June/July 2016 issue, suggests that her practice reveals "rigid and unforgiving structures—and perhaps offers an alternative to them—through an aesthetic defined by slacking, melting, dissolving, billowing, breaking apart." As Smith further writes, Tajima discussed her affinity for

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the slacker in a 2011 conversation with director Richard Linklater at the Blanton Museum of Art. Tajima has also expressed this impulse against mechanized devices and schedules through her freeform performance and sound projects, created as a part of the group New Humans.
